THE JEWRY IS OUT

ne of our congregants mentioned to me that at their snowbird congregation in Florida, the pre-pandemic attendance on Shabbat morning of some 600 to 800 was a little less than 300 when we spoke in late March. There is a Hebrew saying that translates as, "Shared pain provides half the comfort." Yes, it was comforting to hear that our diminished numbers are not unique.

Our Shabbat morning numbers have never been robust, but on a given pre-pandemic Shabbat morning we would have thirty-five to fifty people at the service. I never really count the house, and I might be inflating this a bit. We are down some fifty percent at least.

Our loss on Friday night is more dramatic. On the Friday evening prior to my writing this, we had six congregants in the Sanctuary in addition to the Bat Mitzvah family. We have had robust crowds for Consecration, Sunday School Shabbat and the like. They are great evenings but don't have much of a shelf life. The anemic numbers have been the case throughout the fall and winter. I was and still am hoping for a revival in the spring.

Our pre-pandemic Friday night regulars have not returned (yet). Why? It could be that some don't feel comfortable sitting in a crowd. On that account, there's nothing to be afraid of. It could be that some don't feel comfortable sitting with a mask on. I get that. Neither do I. Every time I think we're getting close to mask optional, the number of infections starts spiking. Additionally, coming to shul regularly is a sort of habit. It's a good habit for sure. It could be that some have simply gotten out of the good habit and it's hard to reclaim it.

Some have gotten very comfortable with Zoom or livestream. This was an emergency accommodation during the height of the pandemic and was never intended to be the new version of what it means to be a community at prayer.

We have a new emergency today. For the first time in forty-six years, we are facing a Friday evening Kabbalat Shabbat when we don't have a Minyan in the synagogue.

I have never commented on the modest numbers at our Shabbat services. Instead, I would write or speak about how our Shabbat services are the heart of the synagogue and can be wonderfully enriching for our lives. I still believe that, of course, but we are faced with a reality that we need to face head-on as a community, and so I share these numbers with you.

So, at this point in this communication, you have every reason to expect the pitch right about now. Something catchy like **CBS-** Come **B**ack to **S**hul. We need you. It's true, we need you so very much, but I don't think a pitch on paper will do much. My intention in writing the above is to share the present reality with you. Is this reality the new normal, or can we bounce back to our pre-pandemic attendance? I, of course, hope that latter is the case. Some recover quickly and fully from Covid, and others have long term, chronic symptoms. In which category will we fall? Right now, the *Jewry* is out. We each serve on that *Jewry*. My hope and prayers are that the *Jewry* will come back in!




ETHAN PACHMAN- BAR MITZVAH, JUNE 11, 2022

A NEW PASSOVER EXPERIENCE FOR OUR HEBREW SCHOOL STUDENTS!

These unprecedented times call for creativity and thinking outside the box, as we do our best to ensure engaging experiences for our students! Passover, one of the most frontal of Jewish holidays, requires us to find a way to capture the true essence and meaning behind the story, as well as the rituals associated with it. This year, we not only had to consider health and safety protocols, but also had to consider the varied comfort levels of our families. Instead of a Passover school community Seder, Cantor Annelise and I put our heads together to think of engaging alternatives. After a lengthy brainstorming session, we decided on having some type of Passover scavenger hunt or quest, so I immediately took off running! The requirements were twofold- educational and above all FUN! The final iteration was that we would have five Passover-centric stations located throughout the entire synagogue campus. Our classes would rotate throughout, spending 10-minutes at each station, touching on a different element of the Passover holiday. Our sixth and final station would be a school-wide assembly when all classes would gather as a school community. To make this work, we elicited the assistance of Rabbi Perlstein, our inclusion facilitator and Morah Shari to help facilitate a station. Our facilitators embraced their station responsibilities and were excited to engage our students in this new and different Passover experience. Here is a brief description of each of the stations:

- Station 1 The Order of the Seder, with Rabbi Perlstein- an interactive review of all the steps that are part of a Passover
- Station 2 Avadeem Hayeinu, crossing the sea to freedom with Minahelet Barbara- celebrating freedom by creating the universal symbol of freedom, a sunflower.
- Station 3 Ma Nishtana the four questions Scattegories with Morah Suzanne
- Station 4 Passover This or That with Morah Shari- an interactive Passover-centric decision activity
- Station 5 The 10 Plagues with Cantor Annelise- an engaging, improvisational, and musical activity centered around the plagues

What a morning we had on Sunday April 10th! Our facilitators truly embraced their stations and the responsibility to engage our students! To say the experience was amazing is an understatement. The excitement and joy were visible as the students rotated through the stations, not knowing what to expect. It was thrilling. Our culminating school-wide assembly exemplified what our community is all about; being together, maintaining a spirit of caring, love of Judaism, and celebrating uniqueness. We sang Passover tunes, moved our bodies, had a super-fun Passover relay game and more. My thanks to the facilitators, our teachers, *madrichim* and students for supporting the morning's activities. I appreciate the emails and texts from families and teachers, sharing just how enjoyable the experience was. I look forward to creating new and imaginative holiday programs that I can share with the entire Ohev community!

MITCHELL GERSON -MAY/JUNE 2022 CONGREGANT OF THE MONTH

In a well-known and oft-quoted article for Harper's Magazine in March of 1898, Mark Twain remarked that "All things are mortal but the Jews; all other forces pass, but they remain. What is the secret of their immortality?" Perhaps we can see a part of that answer as we read the story of our May/June Congregant of the Month, Mitch Gerson, from generations before, in loving detail, to a present which continues to support the values of Judaism.



Mitch's family is one of immigrants. His grandparents fled from the Tsar and from the Austro-Hungarian Empire; his father and family escaped from Germany. After arriving, they served America. Grandfather Poppy was a World War I doughboy. Dad was an army scout for a dozen landings in the Pacific and Mom inspected airplane engines at the Naval Supply Depot.

Albert, Mitch's dad, came to this area in 1939 as a student at National Farm School (now Delaware Valley University) in Doylestown. He met Mitch's mom, Gloria, on a blind date. They married in 1946, after Albert served in World War II. They established a loving home in Oxford Circle, where Mitch and his brother Steve were born and raised.

Sundays were spent with Gloria's parents, Granmom and Poppy, at their apartment over their luncheonette at 8th and Callow-hill. Often cousins would come too, which led to an afternoon of hide and seek, finding Indian head pennies, and ice cream cones from the store freezer. There were visits to New York to visit Albert's mother, Omi, and cousins in Spring Valley and Rego Park.

Oxford Circle also meant the kids on the street and never-ending games of bottle caps, stick ball, two touch, wire ball, swimming at Max Meyers, and rainy-day Monopoly. It included Sunday school at The Workman's Circle (a Russian-Jewish Socialist organization). Later, Mitch walked with friends four days a week to Hebrew School and Junior Congregation at Temple Shalom, where he became a Bar Mitzvah. Oxford Circle eventually led to Fels Jr. High, Northeast (class 128) and SPARC, and Temple University, where he went on a blind date (it runs in the family!) with a lovely 17-year-old Girl's High student, whom Mitch later took to her prom. That blind date was 50 years ago, and Mitch and Carol Gerson are still dating.

Mitch graduated from Georgetown Law Center in 1976. He and Carol stayed in Washington, an exciting place to be a young couple. Eventually, it was time for them to come home, to make sure that their children knew their grandparents, cousins and Oma, their great-grandmother. In 1983, Mitch and Carol settled in Holland. They had three children, Matt, Emily and Jenny.

Mitch practiced law for a variety of firms and as in-house counsel. Despite his big cases, he always preferred work where he could directly benefit people. He formed his own practice, focusing on the business concerns of small clients and helping them deal with the daily problems and challenges of business and with finding long term growth solutions.

When Mitch and Carol settled in the D.C. area, they learned that the best way to make friends and become part of the community was to join and become active in a synagogue. Synagogue shopping was a primary focus when they moved back to the Philly area. In this area, Ohev stood out because it was chaimish. When they joined in the mid '80s, the building needed finishing; the ceiling in the sanctuary had not been installed. There was room to grow with Ohev. As Ohev grew, the structures remained utilitarian and attractive, but not ostentatious.

Most importantly, they met people with whom they wanted to be friends. Mitch and Carol were warmly welcomed to the Ohev family at services and events and on its committees. Rabbi Perlstein, whom Mitch knew from their days at Temple Shalom, made clear that he sincerely cared about people. He knew, and never forgot, the names of Mitch and Carol's children. By the time they gave Jenny her name 35 years ago, they were members. And since then, the friends they've made, the joys and sorrows they've shared with fellow members, have reminded them of what a great choice Ohev was and still is.

They became active at Ohev almost from the beginning. As a stay-at-home mom, Carol was New Member Chairperson, and agreed to serve until she brought in either 100 new member families or one Walter Annenberg – she achieved the 100 members in less than a year. Mitch was honored to serve as legal counsel when the Rothman Building was built. He remained active through the Men's Club; as a Torah, Haftarah and Megillah reader; Haman during our Purim celebrations; and actor with Ohev Shalom Players. Mitch is also a Hebrew School mystery reader and a member of the Green Task Force.

Mitch combined his involvement with Ohev and his love of Israel. As a member of the local JNF board, he spearheaded Ohev's successful participation in the Essence of Life campaign to build a reservoir and park near Mitzpeh Ramon Air Force Base. As a Board Member of Bucks County Israel Bonds, Mitch led the campaign to purchase \$100,000 of Israel Bonds with which to buy an ambulance for Magen David Adom; that ambulance should be delivered next year.

Mitch is happiest because his involvement follows Carol's. He is following her naming as Congregant of the Month, and is hoping to follow her back to Ohev's Board later this year.

The Gersons have shared many of the simchas and griefs of their friends and members of the congregation. Now, they are sharing with their Ohev family the pain and loss of Covid 19 and the hope of a quick return to normalcy. Ohev quickly ameliorated the sorrow of forced isolation as Zoom, telephone calls and now some in person reconnecting kept our community intact.

The Gersons' many simchas include that their three children, Matt, Emily and Jenny, became B'nai Mitzvah and were confirmed at Ohev. Grandchildren were announced. Many birthdays and anniversaries were celebrated with Torah readings, gematria and onegs. The Gersons were privileged to travel to Israel with Ohev under Cantor Paul's (z"l) leadership. And Carol's grandmother, Oma, celebrated her birthday on September 21, the same birthday as the Rabbi. Oma was with us until just before she was to turn 107, and Rabbi made certain that he would visit her and wish her happy birthday. Being of the old school, Oma would kvell that a person as important as the Rabbi would remember her.

Mitch and Carol have shared many joys through their children. Since retiring, they have been able to travel and enjoy their six grandchildren. They pursue learning at Delaware Valley University, returning to the school Mitch's dad attended. Mitch continues volunteer activities through SCORE, where he helps startup businesses, and as a Judge of Elections.

When asked why Mitch volunteers so much of his time, energy, and expertise at Ohev, his answer was swift and clear. "I don't 'volunteer.' What I do is living a part of my life, and Ohev is part of my community." Mazal Tov to Mitch Gerson, our May/June Congregant of the Month, as he continues to fulfill our traditions and his obligation as a Jew to support a synagogue. Perhaps this, indeed, is part of the answer of our immortality.
