day recently, I had a flashback of the Kol Nidre service two years ago.

That year, 2020, we opened the service with the music of the Kol Nidre played on a cello. This is something I had wanted to do for some years but never found a way to make it happen. Through the magic of YouTube, I was able to find a list of cellists playing this sacred music by the composer Max Bruch. I chose one that I felt would set the right tone for our service. Two years later, as I had that flashback, I felt a definite sense of sadness. It was kind of a dream come true so why the sadness.

The sadness today is that it was a made for TV High Holy Days. We could not possibly safely come together. So, the Cantor and I were on the Bimah with about four or five guys sitting behind the last pew with all of their broadcast equipment along with Hilary who was hosting on Zoom. One of the guys with the least amount to do kept dozing off and moving around in his seat. After the service we chatted a bit and he told me "Where I come from, it only takes an hour." I couldn't blame him for being so bored.

We did what we needed to do and then some, but I look back at it with sadness. On the other hand, I look to the future with joy. This is now a time of coming together. As we begin a new season, a new year on the Hebrew calendar this is indeed a time of coming together. And that brings me great happiness. I don't think we can yet say we're done with Covid. As soon as the new booster designed especially for the Omicron variant comes out, I'm in line.

During the worst Covid months, there was so much aloneness and loneliness. We didn't see loved ones or friends. It was hardest on the elderly living in a facility where they couldn't have any contact with the outside world. I want to know!

Question:

During the first part of the Amidah, there is a choice of 2 words- גאולה and גאולה. Why the choice and why is one preferred?

ָחֲסָדִים טוֹבִים, וְקֹנֵה הַכּּל, וְזוֹכֵר חַסְדֵי אָבוֹת, וּמֵבִיא גוֹאֵל

Answer from Rabbi Perlstein: (גאוּלה) לבני בניהם, למען שמו באהבה.

Goel or Geulah. גוֹאל or גוֹאל

What is the difference?

Though I don't know exactly who in our synagogue asked this excellent question, it comes from someone who reads the text of the Amidah carefully.

Goel גוֹאל means a redeemer. Geulah גאוֹלה means redemption. In the Amidah, the traditional text uses Goel in saying G-d brings a redeemer out of love. We could have a rich discussion on who this Goel is to be. Messiah would surely be a front runner.

Many, in our movement, have taken a theological position that brings them to speak about redemption rather than a redeemer. This is similar to speaking about a Messianic era rather than a Messiah in particular. In a particular blessing, we thank G-d for the State of Israel as the beginning of the flowering of our redemption.

A close look at the Amidah in our Siddur shows the word Goel אואל redeemer in the same size print as the rest of the text. That is what I grew up with. Next to that in brackets is Geulah גאולה redemption as a choice for the worshipper. That is what I say in my own prayers and you will hear it in Cantor Annelise's davening as well.

Now, if you look at the Israeli Siddur of the Masorti/Conservative movement, which understandably is all in Hebrew, you will find only one term used and that is Geulah אולה ומביא redemption. Our small print alternative has been elevated as the standard text in the Israeli Masorti synagogue. You find אולה ומביא One Who brings redemption.

Most important perhaps is the difference between a passiveness or an assertiveness. We can sit back and pray for a Messiah or a redeemer or we can mobilize ourselves to make the world a better place and take responsibility in bringing redemption. Interesting that while the traditional text has always used Goel מוֹשׁל a Redeemer, there is much in rabbinic literature that points to an assertive position. As the rabbis envision G-d speaking to Moses when Moses stands between the deep sea in front of him and the Egyptians chasing from behind "Don't just stand there and pray, do something!"

As many of you know, I spent the month of July in Jerusalem as part of my professional development with Pardes Institute of Jewish Studies. Being in Israel was the culmination of a 13-month senior educators fellowship, better known as SELF. My appreciation and thanks to Pardes and to Legacy Heritage, for supporting and funding this program. I was selected to participate along with 20 other colleagues as members of the first and inaugural cohort. For the past year an amazing cohort of supplementary school education directors met over



Zoom with our Pardes facilitators, Legacy Heritage staff, prominent Jewish leaders, educators and scholars. We took a deep dive into Pardes' Mahloket matters curriculum, which focuses on how to disagree constructively. We also spent time reviewing trends in Jewish education and learned about new pedagogies and how we may apply them to our schools. As part of the fellowship, we were gifted funds to create specialized projects for our school community. For my project, I led Tichon in several text studies from the Mahloket Matters curriculum and this past May I brought Rabbi Mike Uram from Pardes North America to facilitate a parallel adult Mahloket Matters program. Attendees received a small glimpse into what our teens were studying over the year.

My cohort and I also prepared for our Israel experience throughout the year. At 54 years old, never in my dreams would I have imagined up and leaving my family for a month to immerse myself in studying and living life in Jerusalem. This adventure would be something completely new for me. When I was in college I commuted and then moved from my parents home to living with Haim. I had serious doubts and trepidation about leaving for a month, more than I care to share. Haim encouraged and guided me and at one point chastised me into seizing this once in a lifetime opportunity. I am so glad that I listened. For twenty-seven days, I studied, toured, and lived in Israel with colleagues whom I now consider special friends. To say the experience was amazing is a bit of an understatement. The breathtaking views, full cultural immersion, the delicious food, the people, the shopping - (including my new beautiful tallit, my very first one, which I purchased on Ben Yehuda Street AND tied the tzitzit myself), - the atmosphere and yes, the streets that are truly made of gold. Waking up daily, knowing that I was in the holy land is a feeling I will always remember and cherish. The adventure was like no other, especially studying from 8:45 in the morning until 5:00 at night, and even later some nights. I'll spare you the details of how I learned to adapt to living and sharing an apartment with colleagues, navigating my way around the area, and taking the bus - yes, I took the bus AND even the train! I am happy to report that I can now cross "living in Israel for a month" off my bucket list.

I am fortunate to be able to share with my Ohev family the unique learning experience at Pardes. As SELF participants, we enrolled in the summer program taking multi-level Talmud and Jewish studies classes. Summer program and class participants were truly representational of a demographic melting pot. Colleagues, SELF cohort 2 participants, and day school educators, Rabbis and Cantors, college students studying in Israel, seniors wanting to learn. I think that the draw to Pardes is that they employ a unique learning structure through the use of Hevruta, or paired learning. The formula for all the classes is the same. The instructor introduces the topic with a group text study, followed by Hevruta learning and then we culminate the topic or text study with a whole group discussion, sharing thoughts, questions and ideas, all without judgment. We are encouraged to be critical thinkers throughout the process which is engaging and at times intense and grueling.

The bonus for me as a SELF participant was how well Pardes and Legacy Heritage treated the two cohorts. Sprinkled throughout the three weeks of intense learning, we had the opportunity to participate in classes featuring amazing guest speakers and instructors from elite institutions including Yad Vashem and Rosnov Consulting. We experienced special tiyulim or trips to Israel's National Library, Beit Avi Chai and Migdal David in the Old City. Hands on, behind the scenes and interactive learning was necessary and something we know the importance of as educators. Our toolkits are now overflowing with all the new information these institutions provided.

Being a SELF participant also came with special perks including some great swag. We had a special Shabbat retreat in the secluded and beautiful hills of Jerusalem at Yearim hotel. Relationship building, relaxation and living in the moment was the theme of the retreat. We davened together, learned together, sang together, ate together emerging not just as colleagues, but as friends. I'm so thankful that I had the opportunity to reinforce and build relationships and friendships. My most favorite part of the retreat was our Shabbat Tish, which was a new and invigorating experience for me. After Shabbat dinner we sat around a table, led by

What a memorable experience

our Pardes facilitators, shared stories, songs, snacks and drinks. I learned so much about my colleagues through the Tish and I'm excited to hopefully bring one to our Ohev community. You have not experienced Havdalah unless you do so with a group of 40+ educators. The culmination of that Shabbat was priceless and one of the most beautiful and moving Jewish experiences in my fifteen-year career. It will forever hold a special place in my Jerusalem memories.

From the robust Pardes summer program, I chose three classes in addition to the ones I took that were related to SELF. My introductory Talmud class, what to wear to a meeting with G-d, focused on getting ready to pray, the Amidah and it's brachot. Our teacher, the son of British Jews who made Aliyah, taught us Mishnah and Gemara, while incorporating music into each and every class. To warm up, we sang a niggun, to wind down, we sang a niggun. Lots of beautiful niggunim. The main theme of this 2 ½ hour daily class was koved rosh, or how to get ready and into the mindset to pray. We did a deep dive to determine what exactly koved rosh looks like, what it is, what it isn't. Is it the equivalent of Hannah as she prayed desperately for a child or is it more like David as he poured out his heart and soul writing the psalms praying to Hashem for guidance and support.

One of two Jewish studies classes I selected incorporated the spiritual teachings of the Rebbe Piaceszer from Poland, who is thought to be a forerunner for Kabbalah. This class was taught by Yiscah Smith, a well known teacher and scholar, who has her own amazing backstory. I encourage you to research her and read her teachings. This class employed meditation and the spirituality of prayer, which was a wonderful companion to my Talmud class.

My favorite Jewish Studies class focused on gender and the female role in Judaism. The class was taught by scholar and educator Nachama Barash Goldman, who is originally from the Bala Cynwyd area. Through this class we learned specifics and text indicating how the Torah views women and how gender influences a woman's role within Judaism. As a class we listened intently, dialogued fiercely, shared, cried and discussed how the role of women as well as opportunities for women have changed tremendously in both the orthodox and non-orthodox worlds. We studied the words literally, without emotion, something each and every one of us found challenging.

We did our best to read the text literally and ask questions without involving our emotions. I learned in depth about how women are revered yet stifled, put on a pedestal yet shunned at times. Throughout the three weeks we discussed the differences between the obligations and requirements to participate in rituals; how the reward could be greater when you're obligated to do something; whereas taking part as a volunteer gives you an out; that you can stop when you want. We read and reviewed modern writings and interpretations of the obligations and expectations, we rejoiced in the pushback on how both non-orthodox and orthodox communities are learning to let women be and not just be the other.

Being the other means that women's obligations are categorized and we must adhere to specific obligations, mitzvot and commandments. To learn and attempt to understand specifics, we first analyzed text indicating observances that women are not permitted to do, some of which I knew, others which came as a surprise. I learned that women have certain positive timebound and non-timebound obligations as well as exemptions. To clarify, *timebound* means something that these obligations can only be fulfilled on specific days of the year while *non-timebound* means something that can be done every day. Some examples of women's obligations and exemptions include participating in Kiddush, fasting, rejoicing and hearing the Megillah on Purim, which are examples of what's considered timebound obligations. Conversely, non-timebound exemptions are wearing Tefillin, studying Torah, wearing tzitzit. While hearing the shofar and sitting in a Sukkah are considered timebound exemptions. After an in depth text study of the various obligations and exemptions, what disappointed me the most was learning that reciting the Shema is considered a timebound exemption, and women are not required to recite it.

So much to take in, I know! If you are interested, I invite you to reach out to me so I can share more details of my classes, my trip and living life in Jerusalem. Feel free to email me to set up a time. From my family to yours, wishing you a happy and healthy sweet New Year!

From July 25, 2022 to August 3, I had the pleasure of being one of twenty-one participants in a Supplementary School Conference on the Holocaust for Jewish Educators at Yad Vashem. We had two amazing mentors, Rabbi Moshe Cohn and Lori Gerson.

From 8 AM to 5 PM, we studied the Holocaust, heard lectures about the history, learned about the latest books, videos, and other artifacts that can be used for varying ages. We were an eclectic group: some Orthodox, some Conservative, and some Reform Jews. Some of us were teachers, some directors. We learned from one another, discussed, shared, reflected, and we cried a lot.

The theme emphasized to us over and over was SAFELY IN, SAFELY OUT. The new approach to the Holocaust, we learned, was not to show piles of dead bodies. We learned to NOT TRAUMATIZE our students. We learned to share survivor stories, and focus on the living, while absolutely paying respect to those who perished.

At Yad Vashem, we had a tour of the Holocaust Art Museum. I never knew there was one. We also had a tour of the outside artwork on the Yad Vashem grounds. We saw artwork from the streets of the Ghetto; we heard fantastic lectures from scholars. We heard several amazing stories of survivors within our cohort, which included a daughter of a KINDERTRANSPORT child who never knew her mom was a Jew until recently; a son of a Hungarian Jew that was part of the AUSCHWITZ ALBUM; a granddaughter of someone that was liberated from Buchenwald, whose mom also came on the trip and saw, for the first time, a photo of her dad on the wall of the museum.

For myself, my grandmother came to America with my grandfather in 1933. Her family was all still in Krakow, Poland. My grandmother's sister, husband and two children were all saved by Oskar Schindler. My cousin Rena Birnhack is 95 and lives in Haifa. I was lucky enough to visit her before the conference on July 24. I had other cousins that were hidden by gentiles and survived the war. I also have a number of family members who perished, as my grandparents had several siblings.

We went as a group to the Machaneh Yehudah market in Jerusalem to experience the hustle and bustle of Shabbat preparation and we celebrated Shabbat together at our hotel ending with Havdalah out on our balcony. You could hear people everywhere as groups shouting SHAVUAH TOV.

Simchat Torah Honorees 2022

One of the most cherished customs of celebrating Simchat Torah is designating a Chatan Torah, Groom of the Torah, to read the last section of D'varim, Deuteronomy, which tells of the death and legacy of Moses, the prophet and leader of the Jewish people. This is followed by the Kallat Breishit, Bride of Genesis, who reads the opening section of B'reishit. The very first words of the Torah recount the story of G-d's creation of the world. Please meet Ohev Shalom's Honorees for 5783.

Sharon Goldstein was pleasantly surprised upon hearing of her selection as Chatan Torah, and in true Sharon fashion, she graciously accepted the honor, even though, as she commented, this honor more often went to a man. She grew up in a Conservative synagogue, but egalitarianism was still decades away. She did not go to Hebrew School, nor was she a Bat Mitzvah, although she did learn to read and write Hebrew at age 14. But she was very close to her Zaydeh Willie (z"l) and often discussed religion, rites, and rituals with him. He encouraged her to keep learning, and to ask questions. And she did! Every Shabbat she read the Hertz Bible, the commentaries, and the explanations. She always felt that she learned some new nuance with each reading.



As the years passed, Sharon became active at Ohev Shalom in many ways, including her present responsibility as Editor of the Dove Tale, but her dream of reading Torah one day was yet to be. So much did she identify with Yentl, that it became one her most-watched movies. Her first chance to fulfill her dream came at her granddaughter Stevie's Bat Mitzvah in 2016. How long did it take her to learn to chant those four lines? Forever, it seemed, but the joy it produced was well worth the effort. In July of that same year, she was able to chant six lines for grandson Zac's Bar Mitzvah. And, in her own words, she was hooked! Taking advantage of a class offered by Cantor Annelise Ocanto-Romo, she was able to learn trope and is now one of those to be counted on to read Torah for Shabbat and other holidays. Standing on the bimah and reading from an open Torah gives her joy beyond words. She thanks the Ritual Committee for her selection, and she cannot wait for Simchat Torah 5783.



Our Kallat B'reishit, Eileen Schein, was lucky enough to go to Hebrew School in the late fifties and prepare for a Bat Mitzvah, but only to chant a Haftarah. Reading from the Torah was still not an option for women. Retirement in 2014 from a rewarding career teaching Spanish and Italian afforded her the opportunity to spend more time at Ohev Shalom. She has served on the Board, attends Shabbat morning services and Sunday morning minyan, and is now one of Ohev's vice-presidents. But it was listening to the beautiful voices of many women in the congregation who read Torah which compelled her to think, "Now I can do that!" Eileen will forever be grateful to Idelle Wood and Liz Nover, who recorded tapes for her and encouraged her to expand her readings. Taking Cantor Annelise's class on trope and Torah reading was also a huge part of her preparation. She has been chosen

to read a lengthy passage on Sukkot, learned a special trope to read from the Megillat Esther on Purim, and was extremely honored to be selected to read Torah on the second day of Rosh Hashanah, specifically some of the well-known verses of the Akedah, the Binding of Isaac. Reading Torah, also fulfilling the mitzvah of allowing the congregation to hear the Torah chanted, is one of the ways she connects with G-d on a more personal level and represents her family. How proud her parents, Esther & Sam Hoffman (z"1), would have been!

Eileen is thrilled to share this honor with Sharon Goldstein (They share the same birthday!) and looks forward to an especially meaningful Simchat Torah 5783.

Barbara is originally from Philadelphia and also lived in Willingboro, New Jersey with her family. Education defined the Kaufman family; her mother, Edith, whom we came to know and love at Ohev, was a high school English teacher. Her father, Jerry, was superintendent of several school districts in the Bucks County and south Jersey areas. Barbara graduated from Rutgers University and began her life's work in Social Services. A loving marriage to Kirk Ponczek for nineteen years ended all too soon with his terminal illness. They were blessed with two beautiful children, Dana and Joseph, who went to Hebrew School at Ohev and became B'nai Mitzvah here as well. Dana continued on to Confirmation Class and was a member of the first Confirmation Band! Joseph is pursuing his passion to be a chef. Dana is now one of the vice-presidents at Walmart's home base in Arkansas. She and her team recently won Walmart's Enterprise Award of the Year after developing affordable insulin for diabetics. There are many aspects of Social Services, and Barbara, as a social worker, chose one of the most challenging and crucial of them all; that of providing services for adults diagnosed with mental illness. From 1990-2007 she worked for P.A.T.H. (People Acting To Help). Individuals and their families were treated with respect and dignity, received quality behavioral health services, and intellectual disabilities support.

At the Klein Life Center, Barbara has helped provide in-home services to keep older adults – don't call them seniors!- in their own homes for as long as possible, ensuring that food, home improvements, transportation, and socialization are readily available.

Barbara has also been the Program Manager of the Jewish Federation's Northeast NORC (Naturally Occurring Retirement Community), and while there she both represented that agency and participated as an active member of two partner organizations of NORC. One of those was the City of Philadelphia's 7th Police District Advisory Council, and the other was the Rotary Club of Northeast Philadelphia, facilitating the support for older adults aging in place and joining the Board as co-chair of the membership committee.

It should come as no surprise that Barbara devoted so much of her free time to Ohev Shalom. You could find her Cooking for a Friend, working at our beautiful Sisterhood Simcha Boutique, including traveling to the trade shows to choose the loveliest items. She and her mother Edith, to whom Barbara was devoted in her last years, were familiar faces as part of Bubby Gourmet.

Whether it be Trivia Night, an Art Show, or even a New Member Bar-B-Q, you could count on Barbara to volunteer for the program. Of course, she also picked up several older members of our congregation and brought them to the Hazak meetings. Her connection to Ohev was made even stronger on one of the trips to Israel, which she still considers as a highlight of her life.

As a partial retiree, Barbara went full circle and became an After Day Care specialist, taking care of babies in the afternoon, serving as a nanny, and working at a camp. But her expertise in caring for older adults will soon be bringing her to TIKVAH as Program Manager. Founded in 1991 as Advocates for the Jewish Mentally Ill, it supports Philadelphia area adults living with a mental illness in their social, educational, employment, and spiritual development.

It is not hard to see that Barbara's passion is to make people happy, comfortable, safe, and to alleviate their struggles. We at Ohev Shalom are extremely fortunate to count her as a vital part of our congregation. Mazal Tov to Barbara Ponczek, our September/October 2022 Congregant of the Month!

Go Green Task Force

A joint effort of the Social Action team and the Building committee, Ohev Shalom's Go Green Task Force helps us fulfill Tikkun Olam by making Ohev's campus more energy efficient and by inspiring congregants to do the same in their own homes. The task force has obtained a subsidy to replace several hundred incandescent bulbs with energy efficient LED bulbs; installed programmable thermostats to reduce HVAC waste; obtained reusable plates and compostable cups for onegs; repurposed existing containers for recycling in all classrooms and key locations; and hosted a speaker to address our congregants on energy efficiency in our homes. We are in the process of an HVAC energy audit to ensure that we are heating and cooling our campus efficiently.

Set Your Environment-Friendly New Year's Goals for 5783

While one individual's behavior change alone can't improve the climate, we can each do our part by following the central tenants of Judaism which instruct us to care for creation.

Ohev's Go Green Task Force invites you to join us and select one or more behavior changes that make an impact. Be gentle with yourself, pick a realistic resolution or two - but at the same time, challenge yourself and your family to make an impactful change.

Reduce Energy Used for Heating and Cooling

Heating and cooling account for more than half of the energy use in a typical U.S. home. Every degree that you lower your room temperature in the winter or raise the temperature in summer will cut your energy use by 3% - and reduce your bills. If you usually keep your home at 70 degrees in the winter and your reduce the temperature to 67 degrees in the winter or increase it to 73 in the summer, you will reduce your fuel use by 9%. That's a very big impact on your wallet and on your carbon footprint.

Smart thermostats, equipped with Wi-Fi, remote control from your phone, and app based scheduling, learn your family's behavior in your home through motion detectors and learning algorithms and set the temperature accordingly. Households using a Smart thermostat often see a reduction of 10% of heating costs and 15% of air conditioning costs. The next best thing to a Smart thermostat is a programmable thermostat which allows you to program temperature levels for when you will be home and when you are away.

While minimizing your air conditioning use conserves electricity, you will also produce less pollution and require less repair and replacement for your AC. Air conditioners cause carbon pollution, but can also release hydrofluorocarbons (HCFs) - chemical compounds that trap thousands of times as much heat in the atmosphere as carbon dioxide - if they are broken or when they are thrown away.

Sign up for a Low Cost Home Energy Assessment

Do you think energy is being wasted in your home? Are your heating and cooling energy bills higher than you'd like?

A PECO Energy Assessment can help. During your assessment, the auditor will provide LED light bulbs to replace incandescent bulbs and a smart power strip; identify opportunities to air-seal, insulate, reduce drafts, repair and/or upgrade heating and cooling systems; and offer financial incentives for which you might be eligible. Go to PECO.com for more information.

Improve Your Home Lighting

Replace your home light bulbs with LEDs. Using efficient LEDs instead of conventional lightbulbs is a helpful step to reducing carbon pollution.

Time to Replace That Old Freezer or Refrigerator?

You may be able to save money with the PECO Appliance Recycling program. PECO will pick up your old working full-size fridge or freezer for free and give you \$75. You can also get a \$10 check when PECO picks up a working air conditioner or mini-fridge. In addition, they will give you a rebate from ten dollars to a few hundred dollars when you purchase an Energy Star appliance, including clothes washers, dryers, water heaters, etc. And your new energy efficient appliance will provide monthly savings on your electric bill.

Get Rid of Energy Vampires

Gaming consoles, phone chargers, computer cords, DVRs, TVs, and even coffee pots may draw a small amount of power even when they are off. They can add up to 5-10% of your monthly usage in this standby mode. Unplug these devices when not in use, or use smart power strips or surge protectors to really turn them off.

During this period before the High Holy Days, we reflect on our moral and religious obligation to help Tikkun Olam. Together, we will do what we can to protect and preserve the environment for ourselves and our children.


