A SPECIAL HIGH HOLY DAY REQUEST

The weeks leading up to the High Holy Days are about the busiest time of year. It also becomes about the happiest time of year. Looking out and seeing the Sanctuary/Social Hall full on Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur is a joy that few other joys can match. Seeing the congregation from the Bimah is a beautiful sight. The icing on the cake is walking through the congregation during the Torah processions exchanging New Years Greetings.

I have missed this the last few years. In 2020, Cantor and I were alone in the sanctuary with the camera crew and our synagogue administrator for the made-for-TV High Holy Day Services. It felt terribly odd, even though everything was totally odd at the time. In 2021, we returned to the synagogue, but our numbers were terribly depressed. We needed to still wear masks, there was less seating available with social distancing, and we did not come anywhere close to filling the seats. Last year with masks optional, the numbers grew but not dramatically.

The good news with all this is that we did not suffer an unusual loss of membership during these difficult years. Once again, we saw the loyalty of our community. For this I am deeply grateful. There may be several reasons why our attendance has been anemic. I know some love viewing the service in the comfort of their own home. PJs are permitted and you can even watch the Shacharit over breakfast. Parking is not a concern along with a few other potential benefits I won't list here.

I also grew comfortable leading services from home during the height of the pandemic. It was something I could get used

to, and I did until we began to venture back to the synagogue itself. Being live and in-person with others, davening in the same space, hearing the voices of many blending together in harmony cannot be replicated by Zoom. A little box on a screen is no match for coming together in the sacred space of the synagogue.

What will be our attendance this year? I truly don't know. We each will create what we personally feel to be a meaningful, spiritual experience during the upcoming Days of Awe. It is not my place to tell you where to find and feel that spirituality. And so, I call this piece A Special High Holy Day Request. As a point of personal privilege, so to speak, my special request is to be together with you in the synagogue, especially this year.

It's been said 90% of life is just showing up. It turns out that just showing up is not so simple, but it is so greatly appreciated. The New Year, Rosh HaShanah, will begin at sunset on Friday, September 15, the first day of the month of Tishrei. I hope we will all show up during the High Holy Day season so we can have the joy of being together at the New Year.

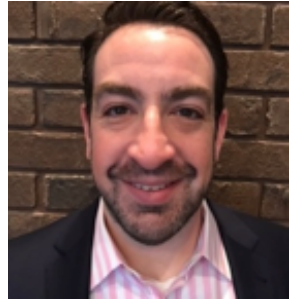
My best to you and all those you love for a year of health and happiness and the fulfillment of the worthy wishes of your heart.

As I write this article, we are entering the Hebrew month of Elul -the month before Rosh Hashanah. Elul is a month of preparation for the High Holy Days. The Shofar is blown every morning during Shacharit to remind us that Rosh Hashanah is coming. We begin to think about our behavior of the previous year and whether we've reached our goals, and if we need to readjust our paths. Toward the end of the month, Selichot are added to the daily prayers. Elul is also a month of the final preparations for the school year. Rooms are cleaned and set up. Supplies are ordered. Faculty and staff meet to examine the past year and plan for the upcoming one. We anticipate a school filled with energetic students and learning.

This year, in my opinion, the Jewish calendar has given us a gift. Rosh Hashanah, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah are on weekends. We usually do not have Hebrew School on those holidays when they occur on Wednesdays. However, this year, on Sukkot (October 1) and Simchat Torah (October 8), we will have special programs during Hebrew School that will include time during services in the sanctuary in addition to class time. Students will be able to shake the lulav and etrog during Hallel on Sukkot and dance with the Torahs on Simchat Torah. It will be great fun!!!!

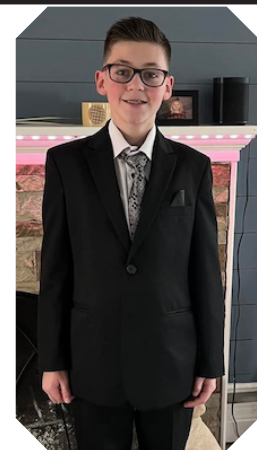
TAYDEN RAWLINSON- OCTOBER 21, 2023

YOUTH CONGREGATION PROGRAMMING DETAILS

All Religious/Hebrew School youth programming runs from 10:15am - 1:00 p.m. Please note, teachers arrive at 10:15am and will not be in class prior to this time.

Grades K through 2 with Morah Melissa Rosenblatt

Grades K through 2 will meet in room 206 from 10:15am – 1:00pm. Snack will be served both days of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur.

Grades 3, 4 and 5:

At 10:15am, students in 3rd, 4th and 5th grades will meet in room 204 for T'fillah/service programming. They will also have a snack (Rosh Hashanah only) and then move to room 208 to participate in holiday programming. The students will return to room 204 for pick-up by 1:00pm.

Grades 6, 7 and 8:

At 10:15am, students in 6th, 7th and 8th grades will meet in Room 208 holiday programming. They will also have a snack (Rosh Hashanah only) and then move to Room 204 for T'fillah/service programming. The students will return to Room 208 for pick-up by 1:00pm.

High School students in grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 will JOIN THE CONGREGATION IN THE SANCTUARY FOR THE MAIN SERVICE.

**Children with special dietary needs may choose to bring their own kosher dairy or parve snacks. Please do not send food with your children on Yom Kippur as they will not be permitted to eat in the building.*

Please note, any youth programming teen volunteer aged 14 and over must have all Pennsylvania clearances on file in the school office by September 10, 2023. Volunteers without valid PA clearances on file are not permitted in youth congregation classrooms.

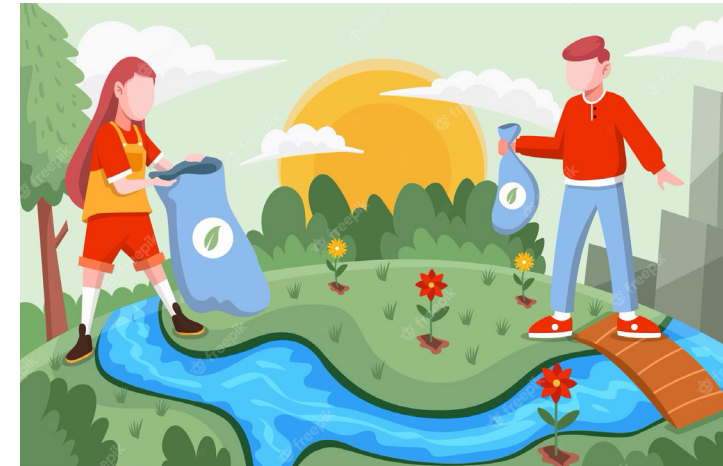

IRA SHARP - CONGREGANT OF THE MONTH

SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 2023

Eliezer Ben Yehuda, the great Hebrew linguist, was responsible for the revival of modern Hebrew as a spoken language after 2,000 years. Immigrants came from all over the world speaking many different languages, and Hebrew became a vehicle for uniting Jews from all of these different places into the nascent state of Israel. Its revival was and remains nothing short of a miracle. Our Congregant of the Month, Dr. Ira Sharp, and his wife Miriam remember their beloved teacher Gershon Weiss (z"l) at Gratz College Hebrew High School introducing them to the song back then. As you learn more about Ira, you will see how his love for the Hebrew language has become an integral part of his being, and a keystone of his accomplishments.

Ira grew up in Mt. Airy and Cheltenham in an observant Jewish family. Shabbat and other holidays were celebrated in shul and at home, and Hebrew School was a constant in his life through high school. When the family traveled to Israel when Ira was 14, it was transformative. The connection with his Israeli family was immediate, and another trip to Israel followed when he spent the summer at Ulpan Akiva with Gratz Hebrew High School near the city of Netanya. USY was also a big part of his teenage years. Ira continued his Hebrew Studies at Gratz College Hebrew High School, where, as mentioned before, he met his future wife, Miriam Handelman. After graduation from Cheltenham High School, Penn State and Jefferson Medical College were his educational paths. An extremely rewarding career in medicine followed for more than 31 years.

In the 1990's, Ira and Miriam took a class on Pirkei Avot with Rabbi Perlstein. Rabbi's commitment to adult education, his warmth, humility, approachability and *mentschlichkeit* were all part of the reason that the Sharps became members of Ohev Shalom. They have turned to Rabbi for advice over the years as well as sharing both travails and *simchas*. Their son Paul became a Bar Mitzvah at Ohev in 2002. Rabbi and the rest of the Ohev staff have made Ira, Miriam, and their children Reena and Paul feel as though they are part of a much larger family, including good friends Sarah and Al Torjman. Our beloved Cantor Paul Frimark (z"l) brought beauty and joy to the services they attended.

Ira's involvement at Ohev is extensive. He has enjoyed participating in Rabbi's weekly Torah class as well as other adult education classes, not only for the learning, but also for the discussions with the other participants. He reads Torah in shul from time to time. Ira and Miriam have also taught a Hebrew course for reading, as well as conversational Hebrew for adults. He prepares flyers for our adult education programs, as this gives him another creative outlet to support life-long learning. Reading to our Hebrew School students is another activity he enjoys. And, let's not forget Ira's musical talent. He and Miriam started an adult group for singing modern Hebrew and Israeli folk songs. He remembers fondly playing guitar with Cantor Frimark (z"l) and the Shabbatones years ago.

As mentioned before, Dr. Sharp successfully practiced medicine for more than three decades. How ironic, then, that he should have been stricken with pancreatic cancer ten years ago. Thankfully, he has survived this difficult struggle. Now he volunteers by counseling pancreatic cancer patients all over the world and helps them to navigate this difficult journey. He knows first-hand the shock of receiving such a diagnosis, and thanks to Ira's knowledge, compassion, and understanding, he helps people to understand their options. More importantly, he gives them hope.

The Sharps now live in Huntingdon Valley. In his free time, you can find Ira playing guitar or chess, reading (in Hebrew, English, and French!), taking classes and walking daily on trails with friends. Oh, and he is also an aviation and history buff.

Most importantly, celebrating Shabbat and other holidays at home remain a big part of the Sharp family's life. They enjoy spending time with daughter Reena and their three grandchildren. Son Paul and his Israeli wife Danielle currently live in Israel, so Ira's connection to Eretz Yisrael continues to strengthen and grow.

If Ira could have one wish relating to Ohev, it would be to promote adult Hebrew language education. In his own words: "When we learn Hebrew as adults, it can inspire our children and grandchildren to emulate us. Literacy and fluency in the Hebrew language help connect us to our heritage and to modern day Israel. I hope that there is sufficient interest in adult Hebrew education among our congregation to build this program up once again."

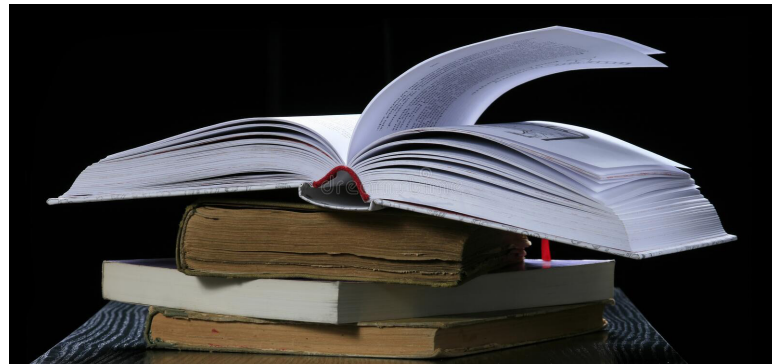

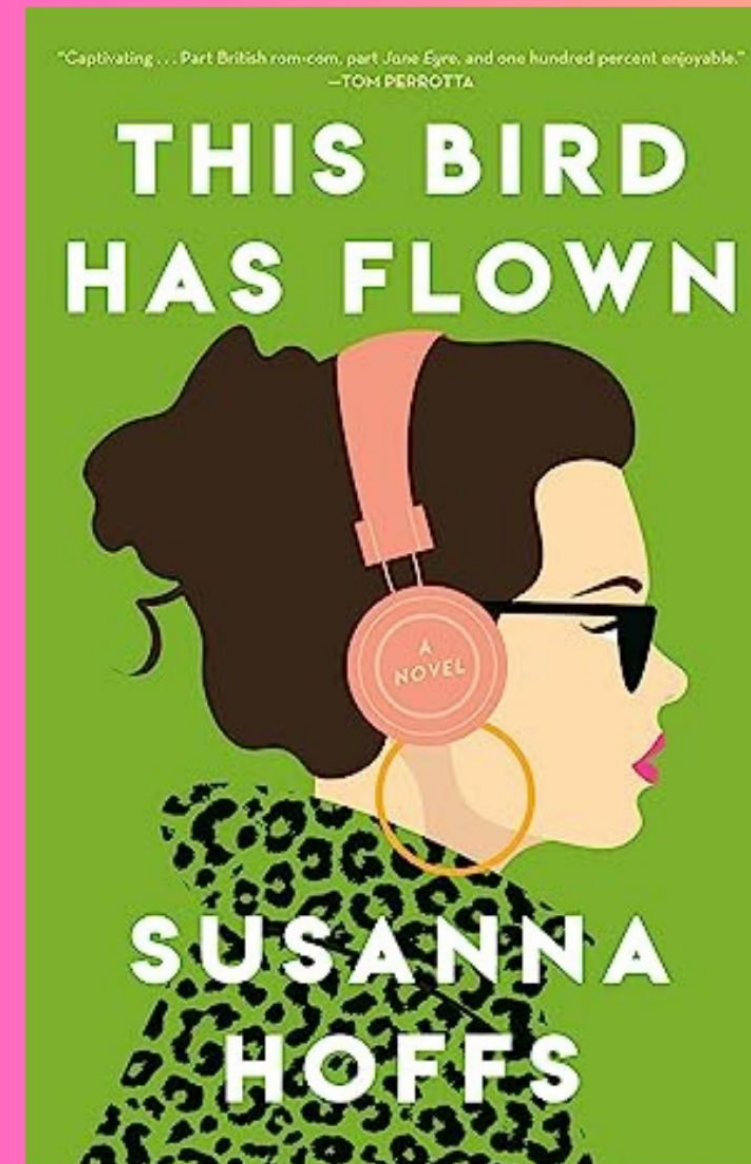

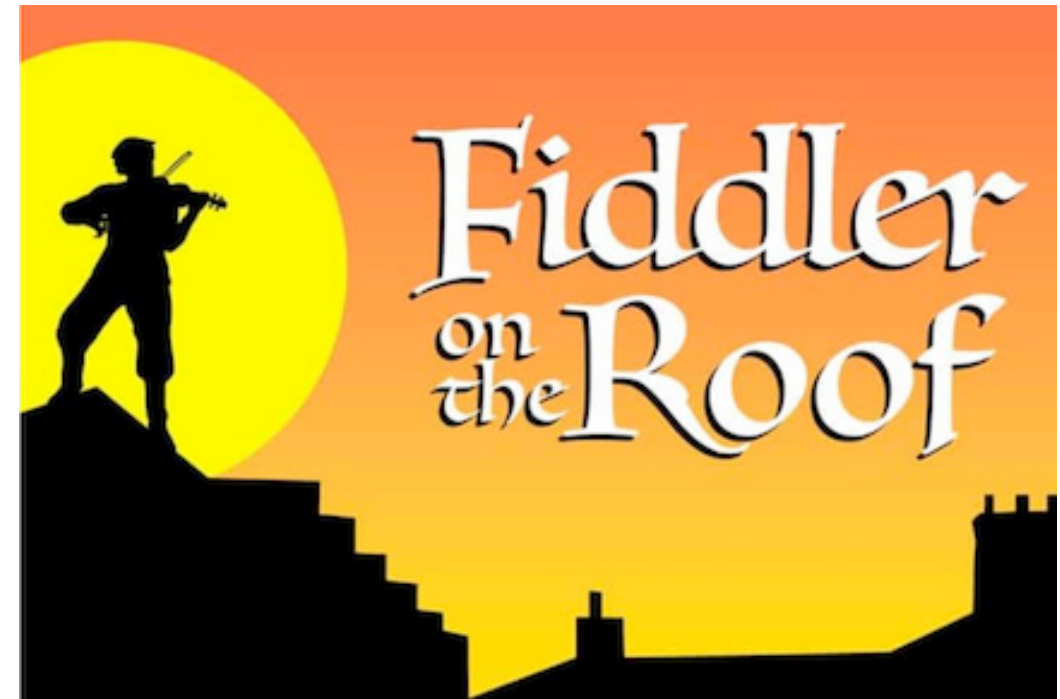
